Visit UNESCO's Newest World Heritage Wonders

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, better known as UNESCO, has released its eagerly anticipated list of new World Heritage sites for 2019. A total of 29 global sites were inscribed on the list this year, covering 25 countries and six continents.

These new entries are wonderfully diverse, ranging from pristine natural landscapes to former industrial sites, prehistoric relics to 20th Century architecture. One thing they all have in common however, is that they are all deemed important enough to be preserved for future generations.

Another is that, having been designated UNESCO World Heritage sites, all of these spectacular attractions can expect a spike in tourist numbers in the coming years. Here's WebBeds' list of the best new UNESCO World Heritage sites that you need to see...




Bagan, Myanmar

Nestled on the banks of the Ayeyarwady River, Bagan is a breathtaking landscape that is studded with over 2,200 Buddhist temples and pagodas, which date from the 9th to the 13th centuries. At its height, Bagan was the capital of the former Pagan Kingdom and an important regional centre of trade and commerce, and it remains a captivating place to visit today. As UNESCO says, "Bagan is a sacred landscape, featuring an exceptional range of Buddhist art and architecture". Guests can explore this vast area by bike, tuk-tuk, horse and carriage, or even by hot-air balloon.

 WHERE TO STAY

Amata Gardens Resort

A haven of peace and tranquillity, Amata Garden Resort is perfectly positioned for guests who want to explore Bagan's temples. Nestled in 6.9 acres of beautifully landscaped gardens, this low-rise hotel features a collection of bright rooms, all featuring private balconies, plus a restaurant, a sparkling outdoor pool, a pool bar and the Nibbana Spa, perfect for relaxing after a long day touring the temples.



Jaipur, India

India's "Pink City", Jaipur is an exquisite destination that showcases a rich variety of architectural styles, representing its Hindu, Mughal and British colonial influences. While this is a thriving modern metropolis, home to over three million people, the capital of Rajasthan dates back to the 1700s and reflects the region's rich history. UNESCO cited Jaipur's "continuous colonnaded businesses [and] large public squares", but many visitors will be drawn to the city's main monuments, including the Hawa Mahal palace and Nahargarh Fort, which was the residence of King Sawai Jai Singh II.

 WHERE TO STAY

Rambagh Palace

For guests who want to experience Rajasthan's royal heritage, Taj Hotels' Rambagh Palace is the only place to stay. Originally built in 1835, this was the former residence of Maharaja Sawai Man Singh II, and as a hotel it has hosted royalty, including Prince Charles. This enchanting hotel houses 78 stunning rooms and suites, fine-dining restaurants, a serene spa, elegant courtyards and manicured gardens.



Vatnajökull National Park, Iceland

Iceland is known as the “Land of Fire and Ice”, and nowhere is this name more appropriate than at Vatnajökull National Park. Covering over 14,000 square kilometres - nearly 14% of Iceland’s total area - this dramatic landscape includes Vatnajökull, the largest European glacier outside the Arctic, the volcanoes of Askja, Kverkfjöll and Snæfell, the mighty Dettifoss waterfall and the dramatic horseshoe-shaped cliffs of Ásbyrgi. Guests can visit all-year-round, but the summer months are more advisable, when the highland area becomes accessible and the glacial rivers start to flow in mighty torrents.

 WHERE TO STAY

Fosshotel Vatnajökull

Nestled in stunning scenery and with breath-taking views of the Vatnajökull glacier, Fosshotel Vatnajökull is designed to blend seamlessly into its surroundings. The hotel features just 66 rooms, including single, double and triple options, plus a restaurant that focuses on produce sourced from local farmers and fishermen. Guests can also arrange tours into the UNESCO-listed landscape. **[WebBeds Exclusive]** For the month of August, enjoy 20% off bookings for check-ins between 1st November 2019 to 31st March 2020.


Fortunately, Asia Pacific has plenty of options to suit every travel preference. So whether you're a proud beach bum or an eager explorer, you can discover your ideal destination.

WHERE TO STAY





FOR THE **BEACH BUM**

Pantai Kok, Langkawi

Lapped by the clear waters of the Andaman Sea, Langkawi is an idyllic island where travellers can spend endless days soaking up the tropical sun and scenery. Set on the island's west coast, Pantai Kok is a quiet and peaceful beach, great for nature lovers. If guests fancy change, the popular Langkawi Cable Car is not far away.

The most impressive vistas are from the Shek O Peninsula viewing point.

WHERE TO STAY


Metropark Hotel Causeway Bay Hong Kong is set in a 33-storey tower in the main commercial hub of Causeway Bay, with harbour-view rooms, delectable dining and a rooftop pool.

FOR THE BEACH BUM

Tran Phu Beach, Nha Trang

Nha Trang's most popular downtown beach, Tran Phu allows beach bums to stay in the heart of the action. Easily accessible from the city's main attractions, including vibrant Tran Phu Street, this is not the most secluded of beaches, but it is blessed with soft golden sand and aquamarine seas, which lap gently against the shore.

Relaxation Rating: 3/5



WHERE TO STAY

Queen Ann Hotel is a European-style hotel on Tran Phu Street. The sleek rooms overlook the sea and guests have a choice of two restaurants, a beauty salon and a sixth floor pool.

FOR THE **ACTIVE EXPLORER**

Hallasan, Jeju

South Korea's highest mountain, a volcano and part of a UNESCO World Heritage-listed national park, Hallasan is a magnet for intrepid explorers. Located on Jeju Island, this is a rugged landscape with a wonderful diversity of wildlife. The trail isn't too long, but the varying wind and weather make it a challenging trek. Only daytime hiking is permitted.

Intensity Rating: 5/5

Maison Glad Jeju is an impeccable upscale hotel with 40 years of history and exceptional amenities, including outdoor pools, a spa, beauty salon and two dining outlets.

FOR THE **BEACH BUM**

Pattaya Beach, Pattaya

Pattaya is one of Thailand's most popular tourist destinations, with a wide range of attractions for all ages. Amidst all the shopping malls and theme parks however, Pattaya Beach is often overlooked. But this 4km crescent bay is a great place to sit back, relax and escape the hustle and bustle of the city. The seas are warm and shallow.

The Hard Rock Hotel Pattaya is a vibrant place to stay with a full selection of fun facilities, including a Hard Rock Cafe, Rock Spa and Rock Shop, plus an outdoor pool with its own sandy beach!

FOR THE **ACTIVE EXPLORER**

Mount Warning, Gold Coast

Nestled between the Gold Coast and Byron Bay on Australia's east coast, Mount Warning is a picturesque landscape of lush rainforests, gushing waterfalls, golden beaches and more. Early risers can take a morning hike to watch the sunrise. The roundtrip trek takes about five hours, but it becomes a rocky scramble as you head towards the summit.

Sea World Resort forms part of the famous aquatic theme park on the Gold Coast. Families have an amazing array of activities, including a water park, kids' club and a "SpongeBob Show".

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Experience Asia's Sensational Street Food

Sizzling and smoking, boiling and bubbling, Asian street food is one of the region's most exciting and enticing attractions. In the modern millennial era, when travellers crave authentic flavours and love to "live like a local", dining on traditional street-side snacks has become a must-try activity.

To appreciate the true essence of Asian alfresco dining, one must experience it in the traditional way, surrounded by the sights and sounds of the city, rubbing shoulders with local urbanites. But with such a wide choice of options available, where are the best places to go and which dishes should you try? Here is WebBeds' guide to discovering the finest street food Asia has to offer...



Bangkok, Yaowarat

Bangkok is the spiritual home of street-side dining. The bustling streets are a vast outdoor marketplace of simple stalls where locals gather all through the day and late into the night. There are few better street food spots in the Thai capital than **Yaowarat**, the historic Chinatown district. Pick a place, pull up a plastic chair and join your fellow diners on the crowded pavements.



WHAT TO EAT

There are so many wonderful dishes to try in Bangkok, that one could stay for a month and enjoy a new taste sensation every day. Don't miss the oyster omelette, a cheap treat that feels wonderfully luxurious, along with Chinese pigs trotters and braised goose. Yaowarat is also famous for its toasted bread, which is chargrilled with a choice of delicious fillings.



WHERE TO STAY

W22 by Burasari

Nestled in the heart of Yaowarat, **W22 by Burasari** is a stylish boutique hotel that gives guests instant access to this vibrant district. Choose from double, triple or family rooms, all of which are equipped with contemporary amenities, or catch up with fellow travellers at the indoor garden atrium and rooftop bar. The brand new Wat Mangkon MRT subway station is just around the corner.



Osaka, Dotonbori

In Osaka, Japan's culinary capital, there is a phrase to describe the city's culinary appetite: "kuidaore", which roughly translates as "to ruin yourself through food"! The first stop on any gastronomic tour should be the dazzling Dotonbori district. Make your way down this neon-lit thoroughfare towards the famous Glico Man, take in the atmosphere and prepare to be ruined!



WHAT TO EAT


There are all sorts of exotic dishes in Dotonbori, including takoyaki (grilled octopus balls), okonomiyaki (cabbage pancakes), gyoza (filled dumplings) and kushikatsu (deep-fried meat or vegetable skewers). Crab is another specialty and many visitors are drawn towards Kani Doraku, a famous restaurant and local landmark with a six-metre red crab above its door!



WHERE TO STAY

Hearton Hotel Shinsaibashi

In the centre of Osaka, just a short walk from Ebisu Bridge – the gateway to Dotonbori and home of the Glico Man – **Hearton Hotel Shinsaibashi** is a modern hotel that puts the entire city at guests' fingertips. The single, double and triple rooms are all sleek and well-equipped with working desks and free Wi-Fi, and there is also a third floor restaurant.



Taipei, Raohe Street Night Market

Whether you're a Taipei first-timer or seasoned traveller, Raohe Street Night Market is a must-visit destination. This 600-metre-long stretch is a feast for the senses. Having entered through a grand golden gate, guests can savour a seemingly endless row of stalls selling sizzling cuisine. So simply stroll along, enjoy the energetic ambience and pick up a few snacks en-route.



WHAT TO EAT

There are so many tempting treats in Taipei that it is difficult to know where to start. For a quick snack, pick up a skewer of grilled squid or some blow-torched beef cubes, which melt in the mouth. Black pepper buns and braised pork with rice offer a heartier snack, and visitors who want to dine like a local should try the stinky tofu, which is fermented before being deep-fried.




WHERE TO STAY

Waterfront Hotel

Overlooking the Keelung River, just moments from Raohe Night Market, the **Waterfront Hotel** is a perfect place for adventurous foodies. Modern and minimalist, this hotel offers a choice of private rooms and shared dorms, including options with balconies that overlook the river. Guests can socialise in the lounge, hire bicycles free of charge, then chill out at the 24-hour beer bar.





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Beginner's Guide to Exploring China

China is a land of superlatives; it is one of the largest countries on Earth, with the biggest population and a rich history that dates back thousands of years. It has many of the world's biggest and most dynamic cities, some of the world's highest mountains, longest rivers and an unsurpassed number of UNESCO World Heritage sites – including the world's greatest wall! To travel around this incredible country, you can take a ride on the world's largest high-speed rail network.

All of these factors make China a truly fascinating country to visit. But for international travellers, it is not without its challenges – especially for non-Mandarin speakers. The sheer size of the country, its crowded cities, the seemingly impenetrable language barrier, unique cultural characteristics and culinary curiosities can make China feel a little overwhelming, especially for first-timers.

There are some simple steps that travellers can take however, to make exploring China a little less intimidating. By following these essential travel tips, beginners will be able to fully immerse themselves in this enchanting destination and discover just how rewarding China can be.

Life Behind the Great Firewall

When you cross China's "Great Firewall" you will find that many social media apps, like Facebook, Twitter and WhatsApp are unavailable. The best app to use in China is WeChat (wechat.com), which is reported to have over one billion active users! This multi-functional app can be used to message friends and family, to make calls, and even to pay for everyday items. Travellers without a local bank card can ask their Chinese friends to transfer money into their WeChat Wallet, allowing them to use WeChat Pay – a hugely popular service in China.

To find your way around without access to Google Maps, travellers who understand Mandarin can visit AutoNavi Maps (amap.com). Also known as Gaode Maps, this service also provides the data for Apple Maps in China. Alternatively, CityMaps2Go (ulmon.com) is available in English, on Apple and Android, and maps can be downloaded offline – perfect for guests who like to plan their trips in advance. To make yourself understood, Pleco (pleco.com) is a great translation service.



Subways & Sub-Zero

If you don't have maps or a translation app, never fear; most major cities have a modern subway network with all station names written in Roman script, alongside the Chinese. This makes travelling around any city a breeze. Also, make sure you ask your hotel for their card, with the name and address in Chinese characters. Then no matter where you are, you can simply present the card to a taxi driver to find your way back to your hotel.

Finally, check the weather before you leave – China is a huge country with extreme temperatures, so make sure you pack appropriately. Beijing's average winter temperature is sub-zero, so this is not a time for shorts! And wherever you are in China, travellers are advised to use bottled water and not to drink from the taps.

Now that you're equipped with some useful tips on navigating through China, here are some top cities and recommended hotels to start your journey.





Beijing

China's capital city is a vast metropolis that showcases the classical and contemporary wonders of China. Home to approximately 20 million people, this huge city can feel unnavigable to first-time visitors, but its layout is actually very logical, with a series of ring roads gradually extending outwards in circles. The central area


is home to many of Beijing's most famous and historical attractions, including Tiananmen Square and the Forbidden City (known locally as the Palace Museum). To experience the "real" Beijing however, visitors are advised to explore the city's hutongs – traditional backstreets and alleyways that reflect authentic local life in this ancient city.

 WHERE TO STAY

The Peninsula Beijing

Nestled in the heart of the city's Wangfujing commercial district, within walking distance of the Forbidden City, The Peninsula Beijing is an award-winning hotel that combines ancient Chinese artistry and craftsmanship

with cutting-edge technology. Beijing's first all-suite hotel offers outstanding accommodation, exceptional services and delectable F&B, including contemporary French and Cantonese restaurants.



Chengdu

The largest city and capital of Sichuan province, Chengdu is a shining symbol of China's 21st Century prosperity. While it has always been an important regional centre, Chengdu has transformed into a global hub of trade and commerce, and a gateway to Western China. No visit to the city is complete without sampling Sichuan's famously spicy cuisine; Chengdu is

an official UNESCO City of Gastronomy and houses a seemingly endless array of tea houses and restaurants, many of which specialize in the region's famous hot pot. Chengdu is also home to China's most iconic symbol: the giant panda. Approximately 80% of the world's pandas are found in Sichuan, and visitors can see them at Chengdu Research Base of Giant Panda Breeding.



WHERE TO STAY

Sichuan Jin Jiang Hotel

The Sichuan Jin Jiang Hotel is perfectly positioned in the heart of the city, on the banks of the Jin River that gives the hotel its name. A genuine Chengdu landmark, it has hosted many important Chinese politicians and celebrities over the years. Guests

have a choice of stylish rooms, many with river views, plus an indoor pool and an impressive eight F&B outlets. Tianfu Square is a 10-minute subway ride away.



Shanghai

China's commercial capital, Shanghai has a cosmopolitan culture and an international outlook that sets it apart from other large Chinese cities. This makes the "Paris of the East" one of China's most visitor-friendly cities, and guests are presented with a wealth of things to do, from classical parks, gardens and temples to the latest attractions, including the world's largest

Disney theme park. The former French Concession showcases the city's colonial heritage, Nanjing Road is a vibrant commercial thoroughfare, and The Bund waterfront is a wonderful place to stroll and soak up the ambience. For the most spectacular city views, Shanghai's soaring skyscrapers offer a choice of observation decks.



WHERE TO STAY

Radisson Blu Hotel Shanghai New World

Set in a 208-metre tower on Nanjing Road, this landmark hotel is directly connected to the New World City shopping mall. Guests can stay in a choice of 520 contemporary rooms and suites, sample delicious cuisine at three dining

destinations, including a 45th floor revolving restaurant, enjoy drinks and live music in the 47th floor Sky Dome Bar, soothe their senses in the Vita Spa or take a dip in the indoor pool.



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
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
