## OZO Phuket

Nestled just 150 metres from Kata Beach on Phuket's sunset coast, OZO Phuket aims to let guests "sleep, connect and explore" with intuitive amenities, technology and on-the-go services.

## All that glitters is not gold... Or is it?


Gold is one of the most precious materials on Earth. It has been discovered on every continent, can be found within the human body and could even help to cure cancer. It is so precious that some of the world's currencies are pegged to its value, and of course, everybody knows that pots of gold await at the end of rainbows!

All around the world, many impressive buildings glitter like gold. But how many of these structures are truly dazzling when experienced up-close? Are these lustrous landmarks worth their weight in gold, or will visitors discover that all that glitters isn't gold? Here is WebBeds' guide to Asia's most treasured golden attractions...



# Shwedagon Pagoda, Yangon

The Shwedagon Pagoda is Myanmar's most famous landmark. Reputed to be the world's oldest Buddhist temple, its breath-taking 99-metre-high golden stupa glistens on the Yangon skyline. It is estimated that the main pagoda alone comprises up to 22,000 solid bars worth of gold, and in colonial times it was said that Shwedagon contained more gold than the Bank of England. This makes it a truly spectacular sight and a must-visit attraction for any visitor.

## Meliá Yangon

**Meliá Yangon** is an impressive international hotel overlooking Inya Lake, just 5km from the Shwedagon Pagoda. The stylish and spacious rooms start from 40 square metres and offer views of the lake, city and the golden pagoda. Guests can unwind in the outdoor pool, gym and a choice of restaurants and bars, while the Myanmar Plaza shopping mall is directly connected to the hotel.



# Pha That Luang, Vientiane

Nested in the heart of Vientiane, the capital of Laos, Pha That Luang is a glistening national icon. The site is believed to date from the 3rd Century, when it is said that the breastbone of Lord Buddha was brought to the temple. Rebuilt in the 16th Century by King Setthathirat (whose statue stands in front of the main entrance), this stunning stupa is covered in approximately 500kg of pure gold leaf and its 44-metre-high central peak is coated in real gold.


## La Seine by Burasari

**La Seine by Burasari** is a romantic riverside retreat that reflects Vientiane's French heritage and colonial charm. The luxurious rooms and suites feature artistic interiors, handmade Lao fabrics and views of the Mekong River, while the Red Rose Bar and wine cellar provide exceptional opportunities to unwind, following a day exploring Vientiane's enchanting golden landmarks.



# Kinkaku-ji Temple, Kyoto

Nestled in beautiful Japanese landscaped gardens in northern Kyoto, Kinkaku-ji (literally the “Temple of the Golden Pavilion”) is an exquisite zen temple and UNESCO World Heritage-listed landmark. The pavilion comprises three storeys; the first features wooden pillars and white walls, while the second is completely covered in gold leaf. The third and highest level however, is gilded inside and out and capped with a beautiful golden phoenix.

## The Thousand Kyoto

**The Thousand Kyoto** proves that in a city of ancient wonders, contemporary style can still stand out from the crowd. Newly opened in 2019, this impressive hotel blends modern minimalist design with classical elements including an okuniwa garden. Located in the heart of the city, opposite Kyoto Station, the hotel also features a serene Japanese spa, two elegant restaurants and a tea room.

# The Middle House

The Middle House is the fourth House under Swire Hotels' The House Collective, offering 111 rooms and 102 serviced apartments under The Middle House Residences. The interiors are by Milan-based architect and designer Piero Lissoni, with architecture by Lissoni Architettura, and Wong and Ouyang. 1 Michelin Star 🌸





3 Michelin Stars 



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
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## Making a splash – Asia's best hotel pools

For hotel guests, few facilities inspire the imagination quite like a swimming pool. Glistening in the sun, they are the ultimate symbols of relaxation, rejuvenation and refreshment - iconic images of a serene summer holiday.

But nowadays, every property seems to have a pool. To stay ahead of the growing competition, modern hoteliers are competing to create truly unique swimming pool experiences. From languid lagoon pools and lazy rivers to elegant infinity pools and fun-filled children's splash zones, hotels across Asia are raising the watermark for aquatic attractions.

Before the summer ends, make sure you check out these spectacular hotel pools...

## Indoor Pool: Traders Hotel, Kuala Lumpur

Perched on the 33rd floor, this is no ordinary indoor pool! Traders Hotel, Kuala Lumpur is perfectly positioned in the downtown KLCC area and the dramatic glass walls and ceiling of its pool showcase spectacular close-up views of the Petronas Towers. The pool is long, making it suitable for serious swimmers, while the comfy sofas surrounding it (part of the hotel's famous SkyBar) provide a great place to unwind.



## Infinity Pool: Karma Kandara, Bali

Many hotels and resorts now claim to have infinity pools, but it is not until you swim right up to the vertical cliff-edge of Karma Kandara's breath-taking pool that you truly appreciate what the term "infinity" should mean. Guests can soak up the spectacular scenery as they gaze out across the endless Indian Ocean or the lush green foliage of the cliffside, making this a truly unforgettable Balinese experience.



## Kids' Pool: Village Hotel at Sentosa, Singapore

Singapore more than anywhere else is elevating the status of the hotel pool. The city's latest pool experience is at the Village Hotel at Sentosa, where a spectacular sea-facing outdoor deck features a children's pool with a sandy beach, an adventure pool, an "Amazonian" lazy river and the Pamukkale Pool, which was inspired by the multi-tiered thermal pools in Turkey, all surrounded by lush landscaped gardens.



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## Annyeonghasaeyo! (Hello in Korean)

What comes to mind when you think of Seoul? South Korea's capital is an awesome city with endless shopping, amazing cosmetics, cute makeup, sumptuous food, rich culture, fascinating cafés, majestic palaces, handsome oppas, pretty noonas, addictive Kpop songs and more! There are so many interesting things to see and do in this vibrant city that you may not know where to begin. In this edition, WebBeds' very own traveller, Han Yen Ler, introduces her favourite Seoul spots to help get you started!

Yen Ler joined WebBeds in April 2019 as Marketing Executive, Asia Pacific. Besides coming up with ideas for marketing campaigns, she is an avid fan of Korea, travels to the country at least once a year and has even learnt the language!

# Dongdaemun

Dongdaemun is one of my favourite places in Seoul simply because it stays open so late. As a night owl, I love late-night shopping, night markets and supper haunts. Take an evening stroll along the Cheonggyecheon Stream, relax while watching the light displays or grab some street food at the pojang-macha (Korean-style tent bars) alongside the stream. For late-night shopping, check out malls like Hello apM, Doota, Migliore and others around Dongdaemun Market, some of which are open till 5am! For those interested in design, be sure to visit Dongdaemun Design Plaza as well.

# Gwangjang Market

While locals may visit this market for its quality silk goods, linen bedding and handmade products, I love Gwangjang Market for its wide variety of street food. This market is filled with authentic local delicacies and friendly shopkeepers. Must-try dishes include hotteok (sweet pancakes with brown sugar), tteokbokki (stir-fried rice cakes), bibimbap (Korean mixed rice), jeon (fried pancakes), kimbap (Korean sushi rolls), and so much more! If you're up for something interesting, try sannakji ('live' octopus tentacles) and sundae (blood sausage). The food street can be a little crowded, so be prepared to squeeze in with the locals while you find your perfect place to eat.



## WHERE TO STAY

**IBC Hotel** is conveniently located near two subway lines (1 and 2) and just a few steps away from Gwangjang Market. All the rooms are nicely furnished with comfortable bedding. Facilities include a business corner, fitness area, coin-operated laundry and convenience store. Guests can also dine at the IB Terrace Restaurant and Pub or enjoy a cuppa at the onsite Twosome Place café.

# Hongdae

Hongdae is one of Seoul's hippest areas, packed with people and excitement. It is known for its youthful and unique ambience with street buskers, indie band performances, interesting cafés, galleries, fashion stores, clubs, art markets and gourmet eateries. If you like street art, make sure you take a walk along Hongdae Mural Street, or "Picasso's Street". If you love to sing, visit one of the many noraebangs (karaoke boxes) and sing your heart out! Alternatively, go shopping for souvenirs, accessories and clothes. My favourite places in Hongdae are the Stylenanda Hongdae Flagship Store, a great spot for local fashion and makeup, and Aland, a trendy store that focuses on foreign brands and Korean fashion designers.



# Starfield COEX Mall

COEX Mall is another one of my must-visit places in Seoul. The amazing mall is home to many domestic and international fashion brands, restaurants, cafés and other leisure activities such as the Kimchi Museum, COEX Aquarium, Starfield Library and regular free exhibitions. The main highlight of my visit to COEX Mall though, is SMTOWN at COEX Artium. If you are a Kpop fan like me, be sure to visit the SMTOWN Museum, with exhibitions featuring the artists' music, stage outfits and more. Don't forget to check out the gift shop, dine at the SUM Café and watch concert videos at the hologram theatre!



## WHERE TO STAY

**InterContinental Seoul COEX** is located in the heart of Gangnam and adjacent to the Starfield COEX Mall. InterContinental Seoul COEX is convenient for both business and leisure travellers. The hotel has a total of 654 rooms offering scenic views of the Han River, Bongeunsa Temple and Seolleung Park. Guests can also enjoy facilities such as the In Spa, Cosmopolitan Fitness Club, Club InterContinental and a business centre.
